New Permanent Exhibit to Open

One of our goals at the Macon County Conservation District is to educate the public on the beauty of our natural world and the history that helped shape our land. We

have a variety of ways we do this, such as educational programming, special events, lending resources, and passive learning through exhibits and displays at Rock Springs Nature Center.

In 2001, a fantastic exhibit was installed in the Nature Center, which taught people about prairies, forests, rivers, and how we can protect and sustain them. This exhibit taught and entertained children and families for 20 great years, but we decided it was time for a facelift – something fresh, with new information and a new concept.

In 2021 the District was awarded a \$400,000 grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to replace the existing exhibit with a new one. An exhibit design firm, Taylor Studios, Inc., was contracted to design and install a new exhibit, and after several months of preparation, the new exhibit was installed early this year.

This exhibit will feature several elements. The first is a history wall: a wall that walks you through the way the land was used from about 550 years ago to today.

It features a life-size half-wigwam you can explore, as well as artifacts and interactive elements. You will also find updates to the existing diorama in the middle of the room, including new

interactives, new information, and updated graphics. One other new element is our Conservation Hall of Fame, a section that teaches us about some of the positive impacts conservation has had, as well as

suggestions on ways to help on an individual level.

Throughout, you will learn about what the Macon County Conservation District is, what we do, and why we do it, and hopefully gain a better understanding and appreciation of our world.

We are very excited to share this exhibit with you. To celebrate, we will be hosting a Grand Opening Open House on Sunday, March 27 at 2pm. Join us at Rock Springs Nature Center to tour the exhibit, ask questions, and enjoy refreshments. This exhibit is yours just as it is ours, and we look forward to many years of education and enjoyment within it.





The campground at Friends Creek Conservation Area has been a part of the Macon County Conservation District since the very early days. It has hosted families and guests as the District has grown and as the nature of camping has evolved for almost 50 years. Early on, camping was mostly tent camping with the occasional small RV or travel trailer. Nowadays, tent camping has taken a bit of a back seat and RVs and travel trailers have become sophisticated homes on wheels. The staff at the Conservation District have worked hard to ensure that the Friends Creek Campground has remained comfortable while offering updated amenities to guests.

Over the past few years, several projects have moved the campground forward. A handful of the pads have been extended to accommodate larger vehicles. The Comfort Station has been updated with a new epoxy poured floor and the fixtures and dividers in the restrooms and the shower stalls have been replaced. In the Picnic Loop south of the campground, the District has installed a new LED lighted pathway so guests can more safely enjoy an evening walk. Also, a new concrete basketball pad has been constructed with a high-end adjustable goal for athletes of all sizes. Finally, the District is in the process of updating the electrical grid for the campground. The last nine tent camping pads will be electrified and seventeen of the total sites will be upgraded to 50 AMP service. With the new upgrade of electrical service, the reservation system for the campground will finally enter the mobile internet age and our reservations will be made more efficient and easy to access online anytime, anywhere. The link to reserve campsites will be available through our website.

These efforts and the growing interest in RV camping hopefully means the campground will be a popular and long-lasting part of what the Macon County Conservation District has to offer.



Spring is a wonderful time to look for beautiful wildflowers along the trails. Here are some flowers to look for at Rock Springs Conservation Area:

Bloodroot (Sanguinaria canadensis) gets its name from the blood-like sap found within the stem. It has a brilliant white eight petal flower that grows on a stalk above an unusually shaped leaf below.

Explore the bluffs of the River Trail during March and the beginning of April to see these flowers.

Dutchman's Breeches (Dicentra cucullaria) look like upside down white pantaloons with a yellow waistband. Check out woodland areas like the Big Oak Trail during March and April.

Jack-in-the-Pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum) is found along the Lookout Trail from April to June. This plant has three-lobed leaves with a flower consisting of a tall green stalk centered inside a green hooded cup. The flowers can be all green or green with dark green to purple stripes.

Violets (Viola spp.) are amazing hidden jewels that were chosen by school children in 1901 to be the State Flower. You can spot purple and yellow variations along the Discovery Trail in April and May.

Look for their heart shaped leaves.

Other spring flowers that can be seen include: bluebells, hepatica, phlox, spiderwort, spring beauty, trillium, and trout lily.

Make sure to check out trails at all of our Conservation Areas, for every area has its own unique community of plants to see and enjoy. Remember to leave flowers where they are found so others can enjoy their beauty.

2022 SUMMER CAMPS
