HISTORY

Fort Daniel Conservation Area's name comes from Reverend Daniel Traughber, a respected, local community leader in the years before the Civil War. While never the site of a military fort, the uncommon usage of "fort" was probably meant to suggest an enclave or isolated settlement. A nearby neighborhood was once called "Whistleville." Known for its small farms among the forested hills, the unique name has more than one possible origin. In the southwest corner of the conservation area stands the historic Eli Ulery House. Built by him on his large cattle farm, it was completed in the 1860s. The house was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1979 and restored by its last owner, Pat Penhallegon.

PLANTS

This conservation area provides a haven for a variety of plants. The terrain includes oak-hickory forests, a sugar maple grove, open grasslands, and floodplain forests. Look for chinquapin oak, paw paw, wafer ash, and Kentucky coffee trees.

PICNICKING

You can picnic in the pavilion next to the playground on the northern end of the site. To reserve the pavilion for a party or meeting, visit MaconCountyConservation.org.

TRAILS

Over 4 miles of trails are available for hiking and cross-country skiing.

<u>Pond Trail:</u> 0.5 mile train circling the pond. <u>Blackberry Trail:</u> 0.75 mile trail circling the tallgrass prairie on the north end of the site.

<u>Owl Trail:</u> 0.8 mile trail that crosses Big Creek.

Rabbit Trail: 0.25 mile trail cutting through the Owl Trail loop.

<u>Deer Trail:</u> 0.6 mile extension of the Wagon Trial that winds through floodplain forests. Look for native wildflowers in the spring.

<u>Fox Trail:</u> 0.25 mile shortcut within the Wagon Trail.

<u>Wagon Trail:</u> 1.9 mile trail running alongside Big Creek and edges of the site, with the best views for seeing wildlife, open meadows, and forests.

- Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on Macon County Conservation District properties.
- Firearms are prohibited.

- Plant, animal, and artifact collecting is not permitted.
- Leave nature as you find it for others to enjoy.
- Please note, the south side of this area is closed occasionally due to wet conditions.
