

Digging into the Past

With Brent Wielt

Historic Sites Manager, Brent Wielt tells us about the construction done at Homestead Prairie Farm, and the archaeology work that's ahead for the summer months.

Tell us a little about the construction work done on the Trobaugh-Good House last fall.

The foundation of the house needed to be strengthened in various places. Also, the northwest corner of the exterior foundation wall needed to be rebuilt. In order to access areas under the house to perform the work, dirt had to be removed to make the crawlspace bigger.

What makes this kind of work important?

A foundation is one of the more important parts of a house. Its strength and stability is a key factor in the safety and longevity of a structure. Fixing current problems and preventing future ones, enables continued public access to the house for many years to come, and prevents costly future repairs.

What are staff and volunteers doing with the piles of dirt that were removed from under the home?

We have started sifting the dirt for artifacts through wire mesh screens. So far we have found

pieces of dishes, brick, plaster, glass, various metal objects, small animal bones, and more. Screened dirt will then be used to improve the trail from the main parking lot to Homestead Prairie Farm.

Is this the first time archaeology has been done at Homestead Prairie Farm?

No, other archaeological digs were done several years ago, including discovering what was in a well. Also, surface collection of artifacts is ongoing when an artifact works its way to the surface or is dug up during gardening or utility work, such as when we installed the new water line to the garden.

Why is archaeology important?

Unlike some other historic homes, we don't have letters and diaries describing daily life in the past at Homestead Prairie Farm. Archaeological artifacts

give us clues to the unique history of this house. For example, pieces of plates might tell us what china pattern they had, animal bones might tell us what they ate, or glass bottles might tell us what medicines they used.

Can people help staff sift through the dirt? If so, tell us about this unique volunteer opportunity.

Yes, we are looking for help! We hope to discover more artifacts on various work days. We will be working under the shade of nearby trees. You never know what we will find. Briefs

GRANT FOR POND IMPROVEMENTS

The Cattail Ponds at Rock Springs Conservation Area will receive an upgrade to make fishing better and more accessible. The new improvements will include removing the causeway separating the two ponds, reshaping the shoreline, installing two docks, and adding accessible paths and an accessible kayak/canoe launch. This summer, staff will begin clearing some vegetation and lowering the water levels. This two year project will be funded in part by an Outdoor Space and Land Acquisition Development (OSLAD) grant through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.



BIKE TRAIL RENOVATION UPDATE

The three bridges along the Rock Springs-Fairview Bike Trail are set for a major renovation, funded in part by a Federal Recreational Trails Program grant administered by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. While still sound, the three bridges are showing their age and require work. Technical plans are being finalized, and Conservation District staff have started removing trees and undergrowth along the old construction access lanes. Once construction begins, the bike trail will be closed for its duration. For your safety, heed all trail closures. Stay up to date by following us at:
