### **The More You Know**



Prescribed fire, also known as controlled burning, is an essential tool for restoring and maintaining natural habitats at the Macon County Conservation District. This technique involves intentionally setting fires under carefully monitored conditions to replicate the natural processes that support ecosystems.

Since 1978, our staff and volunteers have successfully utilized this restoration method, with the burn season starting in November and continuing through April. Prescribed fire rejuvenates prairies, savannas, and forests by reducing invasive species, recycling nutrients, and promoting the growth of native plants. Additionally, fire creates diverse habitats for wildlife by benefiting species such as the bobwhite quail and the monarch butterfly.

The long-term benefits of prescribed fire are substantial. Healthy, fire-managed ecosystems support biodiversity, improve soil quality, and enhance water filtration. These restored habitats also contribute to carbon sequestration by returning nutrients to the soil, reducing the risk of uncontrolled wildfires, and promoting the growth of fire-adapted native plant species.

By implementing prescribed fire as a restoration strategy, the Conservation District ensures the survival of native ecosystems while fostering sustainable landscapes for future generations.

#### **Winter Birds**

Many birds migrate to warmer climates in winter, but there are still plenty around during the Illinois winter. Learn about the birds of winter and the Great Backyard Bird Count. This annual count gives everyone a chance to contribute to a long-term data collection project which helps scientists learn more about changes in bird populations. Naturalist Melody Arnold will begin with an indoor presentation, then we will do a little armchair birding at the Window on Wildlife. #### Volunteer Herbicide Training

Are you interested in helping restore natural areas? Join us for herbicide training to become certified to use herbicides as a volunteer on Conservation District lands. This annual certification, required by the Illinois Pesticide Act, focuses on the safe and effective use of herbicides to control invasive species like bush honeysuckle and autumn olive. After the indoor training, volunteers are welcome to stay and create their own herbicide applicator ("kill-stick") using materials provided by the Macon County Conservation District. Happy New Year! As we enter this new year, I want to take a moment to thank you for everything you accomplished last year. From January through November, 385 volunteers contributed over 9,300 hours. These impressive numbers not only reflect your dedication but also enhance our ability to secure grants and funding for our conservation efforts. Reporting your volunteer hours truly makes a difference; if you've forgotten to submit some, it's not too late!



On September 9, we began adding the Nature Center's library book collection to an online catalog system. I am fortunate to have two amazing volunteers assisting me with this project. As of December 18, we have recorded 819 books into the system, and we hope to complete the project by spring. Once finished, the online catalog will be accessible through the Macon County Conservation District's website, allowing people to view the available titles in our library before visiting the Nature Center. We will continue to check out books using the traditional paper card system.

In 2024, I started emailing out a monthly volunteer update that includes a recap of information from the volunteer newsletter and highlights upcoming volunteer needs. ### **Operations Update**

#### Phil Julius - Director of Operations

The Operations crew assembled and put the finishing touches on the timber frame pavilion they have been working on all summer at Friends Creek Conservation Area. The pavilion is at the group camp site. This project was completed by the District's own staff and with timber harvested from District trees. The Operations crew did a great job with the Friends Creek staff leading the way. If you get the opportunity to get up to Friends Creek, take a few minutes to check out the new pavilion. Also, if you run into any Operations staff let them know that they did a great job on this structure.



The Natural Resource department received a new skid steer with a forestry mower attachment. They took it straight off the delivery trailer and into the field to do forestry mowing. They are working on portions of Rock Springs mowing down bush honeysuckle and autumn olive. The Sand Creek crew has also been forestry mowing on the edges of a new restoration site on the south side of Sand Creek.

Operations staff also took advantage of the warmer fall temperatures which allowed the bush honeysuckle to keep its leaves as most other plants went dormant. This allowed staff to use mist blowers to spray the honeysuckle with herbicide. This allows us to kill the bush honeysuckle but not the other plants around it. Yet another tool staff can use in the fight against invasives.

That's all for now from Operations. Keep warm this winter.
