The More You Know

Rock Springs got its name from the Rock Spring, a spring literally under an outcrop of rock. It is on a hillside on the south bank of the Sangamon River. Located near the Wyckles Road bridge, it is close to the southwestern corner of Rock Springs Conservation Area. It was a popular spot for fishing, picnics, and excursions by local residents for many years before being purchased by the Macon County Conservation District. The spring still flows, but it is enclosed by the springhouse, a stone and concrete structure. Next to it stands the larger concrete bottling plant where spring water was put into bottles and sold locally before World War One. You can take the River Trail to the site. but due to the steep riverbank on which the building sits, it may be difficult for everyone to see all sides of the structure. It would be a great hike destination this fall to see the leaves turn colors.

Would you like to learn more? Please join us for a free history program to learn about the spring, springhouse, bottling plant, and the former Rock Spring Farm. It will be held on Sunday, November 3 at 2 pm inside the Rock Springs Nature Center. Several rarely seen historic photographs will be featured in the program.

O Carolyn Mason Scholarship Fund & Master Naturalist Training: This fund was created in memory of Carolyn Mason and her enthusiasm and love for preserving natural areas. She volunteered at the Macon County Conservation District and selflessly shared her knowledge and time as the steward at the Leiby Hall Conservation Area, working to eradicate exotic plants so the native species had a chance to thrive. This scholarship fund, founded in 2015, provides an opportunity for individuals to share in Carolyn's endeavor to preserve the natural areas and give native species a chance to thrive. The scholarship fund is open to any Macon County Conservation District Staff or Volunteer to enroll in the Master Naturalist Program held by the University of Illinois Extension Office for Macon, Piatt, and DeWitt counties. Three Scholarships are awarded each session, providing \$100 toward the enrollment fee and is awarded upon completion of the program. Interested individuals should complete a scholarship form and submit it to the Administration Offices at Rock Springs Nature Center before registering for classes. The Master Naturalist classes will begin January 7, 2025, and run for 12 weeks on Tuesday nights, 6-9 pm with three Saturday field trips. The fee is \$150. Operations Update

Phil Julius - Director of Operations

The Operations department has been very busy keeping up with ground maintenance, herbicide treatment of invasives, farm site cleanup, and milling wood for a timber frame pavilion. Turf mowing has been an endless battle this growing season with all the rain we have had this summer. The Operations staff have done a great job keeping all facilities looking nice for summer activities and events at all locations.

Invasive plants are always something of concern. The Natural Resource crew and other staff have spent many hours using herbicide to reduce and eliminate many of the invasive plants at several locations. Some of these species include sericea lespedeza, teasel, crown vetch, autumn olive, and bush honeysuckle. Natural Resources and Operations staff have worked hard for about six weeks on cleaning up a farm site on the north end of Friends Creek. They removed some old buildings and dug up a mountain of concrete. We hope to find a way to get the concrete ground up so we can reuse the material to maintain roads and parking lots. The cleanup is nearing completion and restoration work can begin to return native plants to this location.

Finally, several staff have been involved with milling, measuring, cutting, drilling, boring, and chiseling beams and posts for a new timber frame pavilion. This has also been a project that has taken several weeks and has several to go.

Staff are hopeful to get the pavilion erected this fall at the group campsite at Friends Creek.



Currently there is no structure at the group camp, and this will be a huge benefit to this site. We anticipate group camp use to increase drastically. I want to mention that all the beams and posts came from trees harvested on District property.

That's all from Operations. Have a great fall.
